

Worthy Brother Knights of the Arch,

As I write this message in the Octave of Easter, growth in the Arch was just average in March and April is looking similar. We need a strong finish to the fraternal year to achieve our goals at the council, diocese and state levels. That said, I feel that most of the thoughts about growth I could express have a “broken record” quality. You have heard them all before.

To avoid that repetition, I’m going to talk about two important aspects of recruiting that I believe are often overlooked. They are:

1. Getting to know the men of your parish (or parish family)
2. Understanding your council’s role in your parish (or parish family)

The first point seems obvious, but I want to look a bit deeper than just identifying a man who would be a good knight. None of us act in isolation. Each man you talk to about the Knights is involved in many things and has multiple ‘family’ groups that he relates to and who make demands on his time. Let’s take a look at a fictitious example.

Young, Catholic man Charles White is not a member of the Knights of Columbus. He is 30 years old, married for two years, and has one child, an infant daughter Christina. He and his wife Kristy plan to have at least one more child. He has a 4-year college degree and a good job as a planner for a large logistics company. He attends Mass regularly with his family.

You talk to him, and he expresses interest in the knights, but also a lack of “free time.” He says he’ll join “eventually.” He seems like the “perfect” candidate! I’ll just keep asking him, you think, and he’ll say yes sooner or later. That’s probably true, but first, take a few minutes to consider Mr. White in the *context* of your parish. Ask yourself some questions like these:

1. Where did he grow up? Is he local or did he just move to your parish.
2. Where did his wife grow up? Where do both their parents live? What about siblings?
3. Are they “cradle” Catholics or converts?

To answer these questions, you need to talk to him about *his life*. To avoid this sounding like an interrogation or an intrusion, put it in the context of why you need young knights in your parish. Here are some ideas that touch on this subject especially today during Beacons of Light:

- Is he concerned about having a local, family-friendly Mass to attend?
- Does he attend your parish because his parents do? Or other family members?
- Explain how parishes and councils relate, and the challenges we face (especially the purpose of Beacons of Light, and its pitfalls. Those are looming large in the near future.)
- Explain how the knights today are a full-fledged family organization, not a men’s group.
- Explain that most Catholic men need help nurturing their faith life – the focus of *COR!*
- Explain the goal of our Insurance Program: financial security for his family’s future.



When you help Mr. White understand that by being a knight he is answering a call to improve himself, improve his relationship with his wife, daughter and extended family, ensure their financial security, and build a better parish for the future, *you have just made him a knight*, regardless of when he actually signs up!

The second point grows directly from this conversation. To recruit the family, we must convince a man *that he is not alone!* The role of your council is to support men in their faith. **That is #1.** Without men of faith, our order dies out. Nothing else matters. It’s that simple.

Take some time to explain that everything he sees knights do, every liturgy, every program, every parish event is a means to achieve that goal! Fish fries are not about fish. Clothing drives are not about numbers of donations. We are called to charity because it is through true charity that our brothers deepen their faith, discover how faith transforms lives, and become united with others through shared experiences in both council and parish! Remember the words of the exemplification,

“Charity moves the heart to comfort and console, advise and instruct, bear and forgive. In God and with God, we love even those we do not know. This is the charity that evangelizes. This is the charity that gladdens the heart.”

Men with glad hearts become active knights cheerfully and quickly learn to lead and inspire.

As we move through the Easter Season, 40 days when we celebrate the fulfillment of Christ’s Mission on Earth and look forward to the “birthday” of the Church at Pentecost, we must remain focused on getting to know the men of our parish. Only by becoming their friends can we inspire them to become our Brothers in the Knights of Columbus!






## Keep Ohio in the Circle of Honor

Some Knights of Columbus councils have a chaplain, a priest who leads prayer at every meeting, often gives brief talks on various subjects and writes a column for the monthly newsletter. He encourages corporate communion Sundays and other spiritual activities in the council throughout the year...

The chaplain brings the council to prayer. He reinforces the Catholic nature and function of our society. He is essential. Our state councils and supreme council would never be without a priest or bishop as chaplain.

Some councils do not have a chaplain. Chaplains are hard to find. Priests are often not available on meeting nights, especially those priests who are pastors of several parishes. Even retired priests have evening activities that fill up their schedules.

Being a K of C chaplain is a huge commitment for a priest. It means scheduling one or two nights a month. Every month. Usually for years! It means preparation for meeting nights. It means travel time and fuel costs.

At the meeting, chaplains sit and listen as council activities are planned and budgets are hammered out. Doesn't Father get enough of that in the parish?

And so an invitation to become a council chaplain is about as welcome as an invitation to judge the sixth grade talent show – every month!

The secret of getting a priest for your council is: invite him one-event-at-a-time! Here are some ideas for solving the priest/chaplain problem in your council.

1. Ask your priest for an annual Memorial Mass. A Mass for anniversary couples. A Mass in honor of Fr. McGivney. Committing to a special Mass is much easier than making a permanent monthly commitment.  
Mass at the K of C hall should be discouraged for several reasons.  
The priest is the one who has to prepare and bring vestments, vessels, hosts, wine and books to the hall for Mass, load it all up after Mass and then unload everything when he returns to the rectory --hoping through it all that nothing had been forgotten. I once celebrated Mass at a downtown hotel for the annual convention of the National Railway Historical Society. Very embarrassing! I forgot to bring hosts!  
The quality of these Eucharistic celebrations is usually marginal – poor music, poor sound system, shabby equipment. A folding table for an altar. No altar cloth.  
If your council has a "Mass kit" in the closet for such occasions, how old are those hosts?
2. Establish a "Pastor's Roundtable". A pastor is much more willing to commit time or effort if he knows the local knights by name and by reputation. Local knights should be active parish members who often make repairs around the church and school, volunteer to be ushers, teach religion classes, and serve and read at Sunday Mass.
3. Your priest will actually look forward to speaking to your group if the event sounds interesting. An obvious choice for an icebreaker would be the priest's anniversary. Invite him to your meeting to talk about his experiences in the priesthood, his vocation, some entertaining stories, or interesting people he has met along the way.  
More serious subjects could follow later. Most Catholics haven't been in a classroom since high school. They would be interested in hearing about sacred scripture, basic morality or modern marriage prep.
4. Invite several priests to stage a roundtable discussion on some hot topic –preaching, church music, Catholic radio, Catholic schools, the Catholic press, the Latin Mass, or fallen-away Catholics.  
Be sure to open these events to all parishioners. Advertise these events in the parish bulletin and in other parishes.  
There is no reason to hold such events at the council hall – especially if parking is limited there. It would be more logical to feature your pastor at your parish hall – or even in church!  
If your pastor is unwilling or unable to prepare a half-hour talk on St. Mark's gospel or his seminary days, or his views on Catholic candidates, find a priest who is! Or a deacon or religious. Or a teacher from a local high school or college.  
Naturally you should invite your pastor to attend the talk and to welcome and introduce the speaker. Be sure to assign one of your members as host to escort the visiting speaker for the evening. Don't let your guest be a wallflower while everyone clusters around chatting with friends.  
Make sure that your brother knights come to the event as well. Remind them to come in their "Sunday" best. After all, they will be on display as well as the speaker.
5. Nearby councils should be invited to cooperate in planning, advertising, and attendance. We are not in competition with these people. We should welcome the chance to include our fellow knights.

The fact is: we need the clergy to be involved in our Columbian activities. Our priests add a layer of authenticity and completeness– like a stamp on a first-class letter. Our present shortage of vocations only adds emphasis to the need to create more involvement for our clergy in the Knights of Columbus, the Strong Right Arm of the Church.


